MEET JACK MILROY: THE COURAGE TO STAY

Jack Milroy is arguably the most mature senior in the class of 2024. Why?


His mom, Dr. Colleen Milroy, took an incredible appointment at the University of North Carolina Medical Center. His dad, David Milroy, is a physical therapist splitting time between Raleigh and Billings. Colin, Jack's younger brother, recently started at The Franciscan Middle School in their new hometown.

But Jack is at Billings Central, away from his family finishing his senior year. "It was a difficult choice and long conversation with my parents," he says, "but it was important for me to graduate here. In some ways, it feels like college... just a year early."

When first meeting Jack, his goodnature shines bright, embodied by his natural smile, bright eyes, and curly hair. As he converses more, his inquisitive, sharp mind comes to the fore; he asks questions and soaks in the responses.

As Jack speaks, it is clear why he stayed. He leads HOSA (a club interested in exploring health careers), Environmental Club, plays piano for Moses (the worship band for Central), captains the Rams soccer team, plays soccer for the Montana Olympic Development Program, secretary of student council, works a steady job, and takes every advanced placement and dual credit college course he can.

How does he do it? With a 4:00 am



wakeup! He's working by 5:00 am at City Brew Coffee. At 7:30 am, he's taking notes for his early-morning journalism class. After school, he's leading a club meeting. By 5:30 pm, he's at club soccer. From 7:00 pm until bedtime, it's homework for all those advanced classes.

"It's tough balancing school, extracurriculars, sports, and work," he said. "It's been a lot, but it's the teachers that make Central worth the sacrifice. Mrs. Mattix brings so much meaning to her English lessons. Mr. Fairbanks works overtime to craft lively history lectures. Fr. Pankratz's theology asks the big, philosophical questions, which I love!"

But it was Junior chemistry that gave Jack fits, "One semester of

AP Chem and I realized I am not a STEM kid!" he emphatically states, "I'm much more about the humanities!"

His interest in humanities drives Jack towards doing good work. Through efforts with the environmental club, Jack and his fellow students explored installing solar panels at Billings Central. When asked about the results, he explained, "We discovered it takes quite an up-front investment in the solar panels and strengthening Central's roof to hold them. Even with grants and energy savings to help cover the costs, it takes A LOT of money!"

When Jack talks about the future, the possibilities excite him. "There is so much I'm interested in. I love the outdoors and Montana, so I plan on pursing conservation work and advocacy. I've also thought about international relations, even studying abroad in college. I had the opportunity to work as a U.S. Senate page this past summer, which brought about my love of public policy. I'm hoping to balance those three aspects into international environmental policy."

Jack applied to 16 colleges. He is still waiting from several of them, "I'm in this weird limbo, just waiting to hear where I'm going in August."

In the meantime, Jack is taking in every moment. "It's so cliché!" he says with emotion, "But the sense of family in this place is something special!"

Today, the Billings Area Catholic Education Trust is the precursor organization to the Billings Catholic Schools Foundation. It continues its legacy as its affects are felt across our schools in the number of scholarships offered to students, the programs it supports, and the tuition assistance it provides.

For that original deposit of \$3,000, the endowments now stand at over \$16,000,000 for the Billings Catholic Schools – providing over \$600,000 in yearly endowment funds.

When speaking about BACET and the endowments, it is not just one fund. It is over 85 funds dedicated to scholarships, tuition assistance, programs, and facilities. Many of these funds are established as memorial endowments to members of the Billings Catholic Schools family we lost.

The following are two scholarships held within BACET.

THE REV. STEVE TOKARSKI MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

Fr. Steve, as he was affectionately known amongst his flock, was a Billings Central graduate of the legendary Class of 1961. An

outstanding athlete in his day, he avidly ran marathons and with the Billings Central Cross-Country team until his passing. Ordained a priest in 1969, Fr. Steve demonstrated his gifts in every church he pastored and every parishioner he counseled.

His compassion was always genuine, his love for others unbounded. Through his collective efforts, he transformed St. Leo's in Lewistown and built from the ground up St. Pius X Catholic Church in Billings.

He remained a loyal friend of our Billings Catholic Schools his whole life, serving in various capacities as volunteer, teacher, donor, and board member. For many years, Fr. Steve was the spiritual Father of our Billings Catholic Schools. As many said of him, Fr. Steve was smart, knowledgeable, and wise, a rare combination of intellect in one man.

Upon his death from cancer at too young an age, an outpouring of grief from the community established the Rev. Stephen Tokarski Memorial Scholarship to benefit school age children to attend St. Francis Catholic School. 12 years later, the people of St. Pius X Catholic Parish continue to give over \$10,000 annually to increase its impact.

This endowed scholarship provides 8 scholarships annually.

PAUL MAGERS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

1st Lt. Paul Magers graduated from Billings Central Catholic High School in 1963. Paul was adventurous, enjoying fast cars, motorcycles, hiking, and climbing. Nothing was too hard for Paul. He Married Beverly Mohatt on Dec. 27, 1969.

In that same year, Paul entered the military and became a helicopter pilot. On May 12, 1971, Paul was ordered to Vietnam. On June 1, less than two weeks into the country, Lt. Magers flew a mission to rescue Army Rangers near the town of Dong Tri. As he lowered the helicopter, enemy fire hit the underside of his aircraft, causing a fuel leak that ignited. For 39 years, Lt. Magers was missing in action. In 2009, a Vietnamese excavation team discovered his remains. Lt. Magers was brought home and laid to rest August 27, 2010 at Yellowstone National Cemetery.

In an outpouring of support at the discovery of his remains, the Paul Magers Memorial Scholarship was established in his memory for healthcare interested students.

Imagine, history students dressing up as the great Roman philosopher

and statesman Cicero, orating his famous dictum, "The greater the difficulty, the greater the glory!" Or recreating military moves in WWI trench style warfare - at the paintball course.

In Theology, reading St. Thomas Aquinas' great text the Summa Theologica and the 5 proofs for the existence of God. In arts class, new technology blends with oldworld techniques to graphically illustrate a landscape. In language arts, a fictional "World Café" where students read the classics, sipping their coffees, and discuss their books in small groups without ever leaving the classroom. For music and theater students, performing a classic musical from the newly conceived black-box style theater in the basement of Billings Central.

It is through the humanities that students learn how to seek **Truth** in all its forms; to meaningfully contribute towards the **Good** of society to address its complex challenges; to appreciate the **Beauty** of the human experience; so that our students "may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10).

As Jack Milroy – our featured student – can attest, humanities influences him to have life to full. At Billings Catholic Schools, the humanities are integral to a faithfilled, well-formed student striving for excellence their entire life!
